



2024 SNAPSHOT

TMWF's services focus on serving survivors of domestic abuse, regardless of race, religion, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, age, or any other factor. Our Peace In the Home Social Services include a 24-hour crisis hotline, two 24-hour emergency shelters, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, case management, counseling, legal services, and life skills classes, all free of charge.

Recognizing that healing and empowerment are holistic, TMWF's services are integrated behavioral and

primary care for individuals experiencing chronic stress, grief, or instability, taking each individual's unique life experiences into account. Through our Community Outreach & Education programs, TMWF prioritizes informing community members of all ages, genders, religions, and occupations on the issue of domestic violence and how to encourage healthier relationships by seeking help.

SENIOR SANCTUARY

Permanent Supporting Housina elderly Seniors provides experiencing abuse or abandonment from their families with shelters that are safe and secure for an unspecified amount of time. For TMWF, everything we do is to provide safety for Seniors seeking help from harm and violence. Senior Program Our goes beyond providina permanent housina: provide counseling and trauma care, case management, legal assistance, essential needs such as groceries, and social activities.

Our plans for Hussain Ibn Ali Sanctuary Seniors include expanding activities, outreach efforts, and, most importantly, physical and mental health support to our clients.




